

Article II, Section 31 of the Colorado State Constitution is discriminatory, in violation of Article II, Section 3 of the Colorado State Constitution, and in violation of Amendment XIV, Section 1 of the U.S. Constitution's Bill of Rights.

Therefore, Article II, Section 31 of the Colorado State Constitution must be repealed, regardless of one's Personal, Religious and/or Political beliefs.

Colorado Constitution: Article II: Section 31.
Marriages - valid or recognized.
Only a union of one man and one woman shall be valid or recognized as a marriage in this state.

Colorado Constitution: Article II: Section 3.
Inalienable rights.
All persons have certain natural, essential and inalienable rights, among which may be reckoned the right of enjoying and defending their lives and liberties; of acquiring, possessing and protecting property; and of seeking and obtaining their safety and happiness.
